Finland Highlights

Women's Employment Rate in Finland Surpasses Men

According to the latest statistics released by Statistics Finland (SF), the employment rate for women, for the first time, has exceeded that of men during the first three months of the current year. Since such data has been recorded, men have consistently had a higher employment rate than women, but in the first quarter of 2023, the employment of women saw a more significant increase. As of April 2023, the employment rate for women reached 74.3%, while men lagged slightly behind with a rate of 74%.




One of the reasons for this change is the high demand in sectors that predominantly employ female workers. Fields related to women, such as social services and healthcare, have seen increased demand, which has helped maintain the female employment rate. On the other hand, occupations in construction tend to attract more men, and with every economic upturn, the employment rate in this industry decreases. It is expected that with the revival of Finland's economy, the male employment rate will rise again.



Over 44,000 New Students Accepted at Finnish

More than one-third of applicants for university programs taught in Finnish and Swedish have found a place in Finnish universities to start their studies in the coming autumn. Out of approximately 142,000 applications submitted, around 23,000 students have been accepted by universities, while just over 29,000 have admitted to universities of applied sciences. Half of the successful applicants were chosen based on their final grades, while the rest participated in the entrance exams. EDUFI announced that all accepted students would be notified by the end of this week.

Finnish Passport Maintains Third Rank in Global

According to the latest rankings, the Finnish passport has been recognized as the third most powerful passport globally, a position similar to last year. This ranking allows passport holders to travel to 189 countries without the need for a visa. Singaporean passport holders can visit 192 different countries without a visa and top the list. Spain, Germany, and Italy, each with the ability to travel to 190 countries, share the second place. Finland, along with South Korea, Austria, Japan, Luxembourg, France, and Sweden, holds the third position on this list.


Finnish People Don't Have a Word for Please!

Required Documents for Admission to Finnish Universities + Top Universities in the Country

Finland, with its high-quality education provided in its schools and universities, has proven to be one of the best countries for continuing your studies. By attending the top universities in Finland, you will have a better job and education prospects in the future. During the university selection process, you can review the ranking of Finnish universities alongside other facilities to make the best possible choice. In this article, we examine the ranking of Finnish universities.



University of Helsinki, Ranked 115th Globally: The largest university in Finland in terms of the number of students and the educational environment is the University of Helsinki, which has secured the 115th position in the latest rankings. This university is well-known for its high-level education, innovation, and national and international research, attracting numerous students to its offered courses every year.

Aalto University, Ranked 109th Globally: Aalto University holds the best position among Finnish universities. Now, you might be wondering what documents and requirements are needed for admission and application to these universities. The following are the general requirements for Finnish universities:

For admission to Finnish universities, there are two possibilities: the university may either rely solely on your previous academic grades or ask you to take an entrance exam. In either case, the necessary documents for Finnish universities include:

- Presentation of detailed grades from your previous academic level and a translation of your academic credentials (if you plan to apply for a bachelor's degree, your high school grades need to be submitted to the university).
- Presentation of all previous educational documents (for example, if you are applying for a doctoral program, your bachelor's and master's degrees need to be translated as well).
- Preparation of a 4x3 cm color photo with a white background
- Identification documents
- Presentation of a passport valid for at least 6 months
- Finnish or English language proficiency certificates
- To obtain a student visa, you will need documents demonstrating that you have been accepted by a Finnish educational institution and that you can cover your living expenses.

For a student visa, make sure to have the following documents:

- A valid passport with a minimum of 6 months of validity
- A color photo
- A certificate showing that you have been accepted by a Finnish university
- Proof of financial means to cover your expenses during your stay in Finland
- Health insurance certificate
- Completing a student visa application form
- Providing academic and work histories

"Nature answers in the same way one shouts at it."
